Researchers benefit from international mobility

- Internationally authored research is more highly cited (Knowledge, Networks and Nations, 2010, Royal Society)
- Internationally mobile researchers are more productive (BIS/Elsevier report 2011)
 - Transitory mobility (less than 2 years) occurred in 40% and 44% of researchers in Germany and the UK, respectively, and these groups had a relative productivity of **1.26** and **1.24**, respectively (compared to **1** for all researchers)

Other benefits:

- professional (new skills, new contacts)
- personal (broadened horizons)



RESEARCHER LINKS


- Opportunities for early career researchers to build international links between the UK and partner countries
- National partners include FAPESP in Brazil
- Open call for workshops and travel grants (3 month research visit)
- Encourage interdisciplinary interactions and inclusion of social sciences and arts and humanities researchers
